Henrietta and her family were taken advantage of by science.	"All of the stories mentioned that scientists had begun doing research on Henrietta's children, but the Lackses didn't seem to know what that research was for."	Even Skloot's biology teacher didn't know much about Henrietta. It's a strong claim, but it is weakened by the fact that Skloot does not address any opposing viewpoints.
HeLa cells are an important medical breakthrough.	<i>"HeLa cells were one of the most important things that happened to medicine in the last hundred years," Defler said.</i>	There is a list of diseases that have been researched with HeLa cells. However, there is no address of any opposing viewpoints.
Rebecca Skloot is fascinated by Henrietta's story.	I became fixated on the idea of someday telling Henrietta's story.	This claim is an important part of the prologue, because it explains why Skloot wrote the book.
